

Starting from 1<sup>st</sup> December 2012 we have increased this provision to six days a week, Saturday to Thursday, and on Fridays there is breakfast available via The Salvation Army.

#### **Staff Changes**

POST is delivered in partnership with BCHA and aims to reduce the numbers rough sleeping in the Borough of Poole and work with partner agencies to provide sustainable housing and support packages for clients.

#### WINTER ON THE STREETS

#### **Poole Winter Watch Opens As Temperatures Drop**

Since 13 January temperatures in Poole have dropped to 0° or below on a number of occasions. As a result the Poole Outreach and Support Team (POST – Routes to Roots in partnership with Bournemouth Churches Housing Association) has triggered its Severe Weather Emergency Provision (SWEP). SWEP provides rough sleepers with a hot meal, overnight accommodation and breakfast in a Poole church hall.

Three to eight people have taken advantage of the accommodation out of 12 known to be sleeping rough at this time. The hall can take a maximum of 10. When temperatures rise the accommodation closes but POST continues to monitor the situation and will reopen as necessary.

The POST team engages with all known rough sleepers within the Borough of Poole on a daily basis and encourages them to move away from rough sleeping and into safe accommodation.

In January Routes to Roots was able to fund emergency bed and breakfast for a homeless person who, on discharge from hospital, would have had nowhere to go and was preparing to spend the night in one of Poole's public toilets.



#### **Annual Street Count, November 2012**

At 1am on Wednesday 14 November, I joined a group of volunteers together with POST staff to help with the annual street count.

Having been warmed with hot drinks, we were given our instructions and routes, logged in with the Police, and eventually set off to various parts of the Borough of Poole to collect and log the required information. Five teams covered Poole Park, Baiter Park, Poole Town and the car parks, Lower and Upper Parkstone, Canford Cliffs and Branksome Chine areas, and various known tent locations.

A total of 16 rough sleepers were found on the night – an increase of 25% on last year's count. Nine of these people were known to POST and the Poole Rough Sleepers Core Group as 'active' rough sleepers. Two stated they were new to the area, two were unwilling to engage and three were known to have previously accessed homelessness services within Bournemouth and Poole.

It was particularly poignant how obviously frightened some of these people were when approached by a group of strangers in the middle of the night, however much effort we put into being friendly. Apart from the need to make these counts for the Borough, the night proved successful in that people were found and directed to the POST services at Skinner Street. The following day people did actually present at the office and several have now been housed.

#### **Donations For Christmas and the New Year 2013**

In November 2012 we received a cheque for £2000 from Ellingham & Ringwood Agricultural Society who run a one-day agricultural show each year. The Honorary Treasurer Nick Love, a partner at Princecroft Willis, one of our corporate supporters, put forward a case to the Trustees for R2R to receive these funds.

Accountancy firm Princecroft Willis adopted Routes to Roots as its nominated charity for 2012. Money raised from a variety of activities between April 2012 and March 2013 will be donated to R2R after staff chose to support the charity in a democratic ballot. In December R2R was presented with a cheque for £1025, and the firm is hosting coffee mornings for business contacts and neighbours in March to raise more money. In December Dorset County Council sent us a cheque for £3000 for our winter warmth appeal from their funding for people in need during bad weather.

As we approached Christmas, we received many donations from individuals and groups, which enabled us to make this period a truly special occasion for the homeless and recently housed who still rely on our help.

From individual supporters, some of whom did not give their names, we received over £1700.

#### **OUTDOORS**

#### Flourish at Holton Lee

Our outdoor activity at Holton Lee re-started in January with Project Flourish, which is being managed by Holton Lee staff, with a lottery grant, and includes people in need from other areas as well as our clients.

The guys go every Tuesday and start the day at 10am with a talk on wellbeing and discussion on what they will do during the day. They have two plots of land to work on – one of which they are thinking of turning into a relaxation area and one which has fruit trees and may become a vegetable garden with a greenhouse. Each day ends with a feedback session where the participants discuss how they are getting on and how they feel about the work.

As well as 6-8 people from R2R there are people from other areas so this project involves lots of teamwork. Our guys really seem to be enjoying this experience and one commented on his drive home: "What a great day we've had."

We do still need helpers and drivers, so please contact the R2R Office if you think you can help.

#### **Outreach Drama Workshops**

The Poole Passion (TPP) Outreach Drama Workshops started again in January at R2R's Monday Drop-Ins. It was hard work, but very well received by those participating! The sessions are led by Kevin Tapscott and Barbie Brinkman, both experienced drama workers, and mentored by Sharon Muiruri TPP. Volunteer workers are Garry, Mark and John.

The project aims to promote social engagement; foster self-confidence & raise self-esteem; and increase the participants' ability to work with others.

TPP began working with R2R in 2012, running informal drama workshops. Sometimes these workshops were more about talking and spending time with the guys. There was no real expectation except for the aims already mentioned. However, to our delight, two people, Mark and John, ioined The Poole Passion and actually took part in the play in 2012. Mark took on the role of the soldier and John, who joined later, became an enthusiastic crowd member. Neither had acted before! It took real courage for them to take part and engage with an audience. This was a wonderful outcome. We hope to develop the R2R strand of the TPP project.

TPP is open to everyone and is not just about the Passion Play, as it also offers lots of workshops and events throughout the year. One of the key aspects of TPP is fellowship.

#### **Christmas Spirit Shows at Waitrose**

Every month for a number of years now Waitrose stores around the country have given charities, nominated by their customers and partners, money raised through their Community Matters 'green token' scheme – benefiting 1700 local charities. When customers shop online at <a href="Waitrose.com">Waitrose.com</a> they can choose which good cause to support when they checkout their order. When shopping in branch customers pick a charity using the green token they're given at the checkout.

Last Christmas Waitrose decided that instead of making a fancy, festive TV advert, they would donate the money saved to good causes - donating an extra £1 million on top of the £600,000 normally given. Routes to Roots, as one of three charities chosen locally, was, therefore, presented with £870 from the original collection of £290 in tokens.
